On June 28th, the "JATCO Museum" was the closing event of the Sangen kakunin kai held at factory 7 in Area 2. Participants commented, "I didn't know there was a place like this!" at this "new attraction" where nostalgic products from the past were lined up. "It brings back memories," exclaimed one admiring voice.

This project had been carried out in strict secrecy since April in order to be a surprise at the Sangen Confirmation Meeting. We spoke with key members of the team, Deputy Plant Manager Sato of the First Powertrain Plant, and the members of the Third Manufacturing Department.

What prompted you to establish the JATCO Museum?

Sato-san: When I first visited this place in March this year, I noticed that there were

many past units stored there. I am originally from the Numazu factory, and there are many units that hold special memories for me, so I thought it would be memorable for many people to see this place.

So two ideas came to mind. ① Units related to Area 2 will be exhibited at the entrances of the factory 7 in Area2. ②Create a room where units produced in each factory can be displayed. When I told to everyone, they were enthusiastic, and so the museum project began. The planned unveiling opportunity is the first half of the year's Sangen Confirmation Meeting. Towards that goal, we began making preparations in secret, meeting every Wednesday with a limited members to follow up on progress and check the to-do list.

Kumagai: I considered using partitions to separate the viewing area and the equipment. This was the only thing that cost money this time, so I was nervous when we brought it in, wondering if the size would fit (laughs).

We had to move the heaviest units, weighing up to 120 kg, and we asked the improvement team to build an exhibition stand from scratch. We also visited two district satellite offices for benchmarking purposes. I wanted to have fun without spending a lot of money and respond to Sato-san's passion.
