The title is "We will do our best to respond to your opinions!"


The first guest of this commemorative series features Mr.Inaoka and Mr.Shiozaki from the Forging Department, who work in District 3.

#### Mr.Inaoka

# Please tell us about your work.

Inaoka: I joined the company in April 2022 and am mainly in charge of inputting data and magnetic searches on site.

Simply put, magnetic inspection is the process of magnetizing the product itself, which is carried out before checking for scratches on the product. Regarding data entry work, I like producing in-house labels, but I also think about how to make it faster and talk with my boss, Foreman Mr.Asai, and Mr. Ichikawa, who comes from the Forging Department in Area 2, to make improvements.

Also, because I like computers, I would like to learn more about Excel formulas, and am proactive in asking questions about things I don't understand.

I'm happy that the Jatco CVT7 and Jatco CVT8, which we were involved in developing, are being released to the world, but I also feel a great sense of responsibility.



Mr.Shiozaki

Shiozaki: I joined the company in January 2024 and am in charge of the pre-blackout process. Specifically, AT parts are magnetized by spraying them with shotgun pellets, and then the parts are poured out onto pallets after being checked by workers behind dark curtains. We

also do a process called "strumming" to make it easier for the forklift operator to operate.

At first, I was a little slow at identifying the parts, but I was able to improve by writing them down on paper so I could remember them and by asking questions immediately when I didn't understand something. If there's something I don't understand, they'll explain it to me straight away, and even if I make a mistake, they'll tell me, "Calm down," so I'm happy.

In the past, I would sometimes get tired of being too considerate of others, but now I'm fine. It's nice to see something I've made take shape and run on public roads.

#### Why did you decide to join JATCO?

Inaoka: I wanted to work in the car industry, so when I was in my third year of high school, I worked as an intern for two weeks, in charge of magnetic surveys in the same three regions as I am now, and I was treated very well.

Shiozaki: I was interested in the manufacturing industry, and the deciding factors for me were the ease of commuting and the fact that it was a large company. I am the type of person who works steadily and diligently, so my current job suits me very well.

What do you two of them think from your boss's perspective?




Mr.Asai, Foreman

Shiozaki: In Nagoya, there's a cafe called "Piyorin." We also recommend Okagean, the original Komeda Coffee.


In Okazaki City, where JATCO is based, there is the mascot Okazaemon. My favorite mascot is Biwako-kun from Shiga Prefecture.
