I joined ALSOK as the security guard at the west gate of Fuji Area 1, and this year marks my ninth year here. I originally worked in JATCO's 2nd District, Fujinomiya District, and 1st District.

In Area 1, as a member of the improvement team (GKPT), I continued to analyze unnecessary movements while working by looking at photos of workers taken at each factory, and to use this information to improve work.

After working in the construction department and the service center, I retired at the age of 60 and worked for another company after retirement, but when I was introduced to someone I had met while I was still working, I found out that ALSOK was recruiting for a security guard position and decided to join the company. I am in charge of the west gate, which is often used by contractors, and some of the people there are familiar with me from my days as an employee, so I am able to respond smoothly. This may have also been one of the reasons why ALSOK hired us.

I enjoy communication, so I find this job, which involves a lot of talking with people, very fulfilling. My work hours are early in the morning, and I commute by car from Shimizu Ward, so I have to get up at around 3 a.m., but my wife helps me out. Morning activities have their advantages, because I get up early in the morning and have time after lunch, which allows me to watch my grandson play on the high school soccer team.

Now I am stress-free and satisfied with my well-balanced life.


